

For Reflection and Discussion

Week of November 17, 2024

"The Gospel According to Matthew:
Doing Unto Others"
Matthew 7:12

Read Matthew 7:1-12. We will focus on verse 12.

- 1. The Jewish Talmud states, "What is hateful to you, do not do to anyone else." Likewise, Confucius told his followers, "Do not do to others what you would not wish done to you."
 - How does Jesus' words in verse 12 go beyond these commands?
 - What does this say about the impossibility of the Christian faith?
- 2. Look at Jesus' words in Matthew 7:1-6.
 - How is verse 12 a continuation and a direct application of verses 1-6?
 - Why is it that we dislike being judged? Why would others dislike being judged as well?
- 3. Look at Matthew 7:9-11
 - How does God's treatment of us in prayer show us how we should be treating others?

- 4. How does Jesus' command to "do unto others" encapsulate the broader teachings of the Law and the Prophets?
 - How does this deepen your understanding of the Old Testament?
- 5. In what ways does treating others as you would like to be treated go beyond mere actions to affect your attitudes and feelings towards them?
 - What is the place of empathy in fulfilling this command?
 - What are some ways that we can understand the needs of others?
- 6. What are some barriers that keep us from following the Golden Rule, especially towards those who differ from us?
- 7. How does recognizing our inability to perfectly follow the Golden Rule point us to our need for God's grace and transformation?
 - How does this affect your view of salvation and sanctification?
- 8. Can you share a recent situation where you applied, or failed to apply, the Golden Rule? What was the outcome?
- 9. Think of a relationship that is currently strained. How could applying the Golden Rule help mend this relationship?
 - What specific steps could you take this week?
